It had always been a dream of Alisa's to be a Marine. An inoperable brain tumor derailed her dream and left her temporarily paralyzed and unable to speak. She battled her way through rehab. When presented with the opportunity to declare her most heartfelt wish, Alisa said it was an easy decision to make: she wished she could be a Marine.

Alisa arrived via limo to Camp Pendleton where she was presented with a Marine Corps uniform complete with PFC pins. She watched the recruits in barracks being trained and disciplined by USMC drill instructors.

During her second day, Alisa went to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot where she was greeted as a Marine, had front row seating to the presentation of the colors, and was mentioned during the speech by the Brigadier General of the USMC Sand Diego. During the ceremony Alisa sat next to a retired Major General in his nineties who had heard about Alisa and asked to meet with her after the ceremony. He presented Alisa with his own USMC coin which left Alisa and her mother with tears in their eyes. Through donors, Alisa was able to be her one true heartfelt wish.
